The state public service commission, who recently investigated the property of the Stayton Water Power Co., has directed the company to keep the intake of its ditch open and unobstructed at all times by promptly removing gravel and other obstructions; to raise and repair the banks of the ditch which brings the water from the Santiam river; to improve and raise the "willow dam" on the north side of the mill pond to such a height as will prevent water from escaping into the ditch of the Salem Flouring Mill Water Company and retain a sufficient head of water in the mill pond to adequately supply the needs of the patrons of said utility; and to install and maintain a boom across the outlet from the pond in order to prevent saw logs from haphazardly entering the ditch and forming jams.—Salem Statesman
