## You Can Make Excellent Cake with Fewer Eggs

### CREAM LAYER CAKE

#### Old Way

1 cup sugar  
1/2 cup milk  
2 cups flour

3 EGGS  
1/2 cup shortening  
1 teaspoon flavoring

#### New Way

1 cup sugar  
1 cup milk  
2 cups flour  
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder  
1 EGG  
2 tablespoons shortening  
1 teaspoon flavoring

Makes 1 Large 2-Layer Cake

**DIRECTIONS**—Cream the sugar and shortening together, then mix in the eggs. After sifting the flour and Royal Baking Powder together two or three times, add it all to the mixture. Gradually add the milk and beat with spoon until you have a smooth pour batter. Add the flavoring. Pour into greased layer cake tins and bake in a moderately hot oven for twenty minutes. This cake is best baked in two layers. Put together with cream filling and spread with white icing.

**In a French War Hospital.** Serving a community of fifty a three course meal—soup, meat and vegetables and dessert—is a man size proposition, says Elizabeth Frazer in the Saturday Evening Post. "More bread, mees!" "My serviette, mees!" "Have you forgotten me, mees?" "My soup's tipped into my bed! I'm all out, mees!" And all in a rapid bubble of French that made my head spin. At last in sheer desperation I addressed them in the American language: "You darned kids—shut up!"

**The Little Oyster Crab.** The captain of a foreign ship, in port at Baltimore, at an entertainment given by friends was delighted with the oysters which were on the menu.
