## Second Liberty Loan Opened

For the purpose of equipping with arms, clothing and food our gallant soldiers who have been called to the field; maintaining our Navy and our valiant tars upon the high seas; providing the necessary means to pay the wages of our soldiers and sailors and, if the bill now pending in the Congress passes, the monthly allowances for the support of their dependent families and to supply them with life insurance; constructing a great fleet of merchant vessels to maintain the line of communication with our brave troops in France, and to keep our commerce afloat upon the high seas in defiance of the German Kaiser and his submarines; creating a great fleet of aeroplanes, which will give complete supremacy in the air to the United States and the brave nations fighting with us against the German Military menace; and for other necessary war purposes.

There is now offered to the American people a new issue of \$3,000,000,000 of bonds to be known as the Second Liberty Loan. They issue in such denominations and upon such terms that every patriotic citizen will have an opportunity to assist the Government by lending his money upon the security of a United States Government bond.

## Price of Wheat To Be Maintained

We are assured that the price of wheat determined by the President will be maintained throughout the year by the Food Administration, and that there can be no objection in holding wheat. In fact, the farmer saves interest and deterioration by marketing early. At the present time the railroads can handle more wheat to storage points for ready distribution and to mills to be manufactured into flour for domestic consumption and exportation to our allies where it is much needed and for which ships are available at ports.

The railroads wish to appeal to the farmers to bring their wheat to market now. Later in the Fall the handling of many more products will cause congestion and delay.

The railways are now being operated in common to serve the community. The demands for movements of military and supplies will be an increasing burden. Therefore, the railways must have the co-operation of the entire community.
