School Notes

The road has been hauled and every student in high school is certainly thankful and wishes to thank every one who assisted in the work. The boys met early Friday morning and began the work. Each had his bit to do. The girls prepared the lunch, which was served in the Domestic Science room of the old school building.

The Freshmen and other new students were entertained at the high school last Thursday evening by the old students. The evening was spent in playing various games. Light refreshments were served late in the evening.

Many of the high school students and grade pupils attended the State Fair Wednesday of last week. Two trucks were hired and in that way conveyance at a reduced price was provided.

A Literary Society has been organized in high. The two divisions, of which Freda Allis and Selma Schuff are captains, have just organized temporarily and a committee has been appointed to frame up the constitution and by-laws.

Beginning Oct. 12, there will be class Basketball games every Friday evening. Two games will be played each evening. Oct. 12 Seniors vs. Juniors; Sophomores vs. Freshmen. The Teachers' Training Class has begun teaching in the grades and the students in this class show great interest in the work.

Chairs and sewing machines for the Domestic Science department have arrived and all laboratory work is to be done in the prepared rooms.

SUMMONS

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for the County of Marion. Department No. 2. Stayton State Bank, a Corporation, Plaintiff, vs. Edward B. Hunt, and Anna M. Hunt, his wife, Defendants.

To Edward B. Hunt and Anna M. Hunt defendants above named.
