## Postage Rates Raised

Beginning Nov. 2, letters of an ounce or less in weight will take 3 cents, and postals for a long time bought for one cent will require two cents.

This does not include letters mailed to persons in the city or delivered by rural routes. These letters will continue to be 2 cents but if you wish to send a letter outside, you will have to pay 3 cents. It will, however, cost 2 cents to send a postal, no matter where it goes. Until new postal cards are placed on sale a person mailing one of the one cent ones must after Nov. 2 place a 1 cent stamp on it.


According to Postmaster Myers, of Portland, this is the first time in 100 years that the government has adopted a postal rate to bring a revenue to the government.
