There is practically no excuse for you if you do not own a liberty bond. You are the worst kind of a slacker for you have failed to do the very easiest thing possible to help in this struggle.

Buying a Liberty Bond is just as safe as arranging to buy five ten dollar bills and it is a whole lot better for when you have paid for a \$50 Liberty Bond you have something drawing 4 per cent interest which is just as good for money as the currency and just as safe. Don't hesitate, now is the time. Don't force the government to resort to taxation when we are offered an opportunity to carry the loan as an investment drawing interest.

Remember your boy may be the next to go and you will want him fully equipped. Above everything else it is your patriotic duty to back your government to the extent of your ability at this time.
