The estimated population of Turkey before the war was roughly 21,000,000, of which 7,000,000 were Turks, 9,000,000 Arabs, 1,500,000 Ar menians, 1,500,000 Greeks, 1,500,000 Kurds, and the remainder Druses, Jews and the smaller tribes. The Turkish newspapers have recently shown some anxiety as to the large decrease in population intely caused by the war and the prevalence of disease and have urged the government to take steps to

decrease mortality and increase the oirth rate.
