### SUMMONS

In the Circuit Court of the State of  
Oregon for Marion County. Depart-  
ment No. 2. Marie Bielser, Plaintiff,  
vs. Arnold Bielser, Defendant.

To Arnold Bielser, the defendant  
above named; In the name of the State  
of Oregon, you are hereby required to  
appear and answer the complaint filed  
against you in the above entitled cause  
and court on or before six weeks from  
the date of the first publication of this  
summons as herein specified and in any  
event on or before April 27, 1918, and  
if you fail to so answer or appear in the  
above entitled cause, for want thereof,  
the plaintiff will apply to the court for  
the relief demanded in her complaint on  
file in said cause and court, and will  
take judgment and decree against you  
substantially as follows.

A decree forever dissolving the bonds  
of matrimony existing between you and  
plaintiff and awarding to plaintiff the  
future care and custody of said child,  
Mary Bielser, and Dora Bielser,

to assist in their support the sum of  
\$30.00 per month from the date of your
