STAYTON GOING OVER THE TOP IN THE BOND DRIVE

Only a Question of a few Days Until our Community will be There--People Responding Liberally to the Government Call

Last Friday evening the Third Liberty Loan drive was formally opened in the Star Theatre by a splendid program consisting of solos by both Mrs. Ringo and Mrs. Mayo and some clever work by Mr. Patton the well known Salem magician. The main event of the evening was a stirring patriotic address by Louis Lachmund formerly mayor of Salem. Those who were unable to be present missed a rare treat as the speaker was alive to his subject and impressed all present with the idea that we have a big job ahead of us and the only way to do is to get right in and finish it. The real work of taking subscription however did not commence until Saturday but the residents of the community are showing they are in earnest as the first few days over \$13,500, was subscribed, this is a splendid beginning but while our quota is a little over \$32,000, we will not be satisfied with that small amount for the administration can and will use wisely all we can raise. The people throughout the country are giving their answer to the present German offensive by shelling out the dollars with unprecedented liberality and freedom. Our freedom and liberty are at stake and we have already sent several hundred thousand of our boys to the front and many thousand are now ready to go and surely we will not fail to back them up with our money for while they are giving their all we are only asked to loan our money, and the entire resources of our government are back of the bonds we are buying as a

guarantee of their value and a good rate of interest is being paid so do not wait but buy bonds and more bonds.

Wilbur Withdraws From the Race

Since announcing his candidacy for representative from Marion county J. P. Wilbur has reconsidered his action and owing to the trying times through which the country is passing and being a woolen manufacturer he feels that he can serve his country better making blankets than making laws, and wishes to thank all his friends who had so warmly pledged him their support.
