SUMMONS.

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for the County of Marion, Department No. 2

Grant Murphy as Administrator of the Estate of S. H. Burson deceased, plaintiff vs. O. L. Burson and Fannie Burson, his wife, Defendants.

To Fannie Burson, one of the defendants above named.

In the name of the State of Oregon, You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled Court and suit within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this Summons, to-wit: On or before the 23rd day of May, 1918, and if you fail so to answer, for want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in the complaint, viz:

For a foreclosure upon the following described premises, to-wit:
