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The Farmers' Choice

That Hon. Alex LaFollette is receiving favor on the part of the farmers in counties of Oregon outside of the one he represents in the state senate is quite apparent. A few days ago the Tribune editor met a farmer from Polk county in Salem who said: "I want to call your attention to a man by the name of Alex LaFollette now holding a position as one of the senators from Marion county. I am always delighted to hear you speak of this man, and if the state has any more like him I would like to see them in the senate."

There is much truth in what this farmer said. The public service needs more men like him. It would be a great personal gratification to many of the senator's friends to advance him to a still higher position, but that is im-

possible at this time and the least the people can do for this worthy representative is to support him in the republican primaries. Besides, his rugged honesty and his plodding faithfulness are especially needed in the difficult position he now seeks. He is relied upon heavily for his loyalty and judgement are unexcelled.

If it required a vote of the entire population of the state to nominate Mr. LaFollette as candidate for state senator from this county he would be made to feel that he had the confidence of the entire republican party, for his loyalty to the people has made him prominent in other counties as well as in his home county. It is believed that his faithfulness in the senate has made him so solid that nothing short of a load of dynamite can dislodge him or prevent his nomination and re-election.—Turner Tribune.

Rural Carrier Examination

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the county of Marion, Ore., to be held at Salem May 25, 1918 to fill the position of rural carrier at Turner and Salem and other vacancies that may later occur on rural routes from other post offices in the above-mentioned county. The examination will be open only to citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory of a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form No. 1977. This form and application blanks may be obtained from the offices mentioned above or from the United States Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C. Application should be forwarded to the Commission at Washington at the earliest practicable date.

The vacancy for which the examination is announced at Salem is caused by the enlistment of the carrier formerly employed on the route. Upon his honorable discharge from the military service of the Government he will be entitled to reinstatement to his former position as carrier on this route in accordance with the statute approved July 28, 1916, which is as follows:

"Any postal employee who has entered the military service of the United States or who shall hereafter enter it shall, upon being honorably discharged therefrom, be permitted to resume his position in the postal department which he left in order to enter such service."

However, any person appointed to this position may, in the discretion of the Post Office Department, be assigned to other parts of the postal service; or transferred to other branches of the classified service for which he is eligible.

SUMMONS.

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for the County of Marion, Department No. 2

Grant Murphy as Administrator of the Estate of S. H. Burson deceased, plaintiff vs. O. L. Burson and Fannie Burson, his wife, Defendants.

To Fannie Burson, one of the defendants above named.

In the name of the State of Oregon, You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled Court and suit within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this Summons, to-wit: On or before the 23rd day of May, 1918, and if you fail so to answer, or want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in the complaint, viz:

For a foreclosure upon the following described premises, to-wit:

Beginning at the quarter Section corner between sections 7 and 9 in Township 9 South, Range 1 West of the Willamette Meridian, Marion County, Oregon; thence West 8 chains; thence North 25° 30' West 14.92 chains; thence west 5.90 chains to the middle of the Salem Flouring Mills water ditch; thence down said ditch to a point where the middle of the same is intersected by the East line of a 30 acre tract of land owned by E. C. Baker; thence north 2.00 chains to the Northeast corner of said 30 acre tract; thence North 89° 30' East 8.44 chains to the Northeast corner of E. C. Baker's land; thence South 25° 30' East 27.22 chains to the place of beginning and containing 23.53 acres, more or less, situated in Marion County and State of Oregon.

Also for a judgment against the defendants O. L. Burson and Fannie Burson for the sum of \$235.00 together with interest thereon at the rate of eight per cent per annum, from the 17th day of September 1916 until paid and for the further sum of \$50.00, attorney's fees, and for the costs and disbursements of this suit; that the usual decree be made for the sale of said premises by the sheriff of said Marion County, Oregon according to law and practice of this court; that the proceeds of said sale be applied toward the payment of the amount due the plaintiff, including attorney's fees and the costs of this suit; and that defendants O. L. Burson and Fannie Burson and all persons claiming under or through them, or either of them subsequent to the execution of the mortgage set forth in said complaint, whether as purchasers, incumbrancers, or otherwise, may be barred and foreclosed of all their right, claims, liens, estates, title, interest and equity of redemption, in, on, or to said premises and every part thereof; that the plaintiff may become a purchaser at said sale and that the sheriff execute a deed to the purchaser; that said purchaser be let into the possession of said premises and the whole thereof upon the purchase of the same and that plaintiff have such other and further relief in the premises as to the court may seem just and equitable.
