Hashimura Togo

Born in Tokio, Japan, and educated in that city and at the University of Chicago, Sessue Hayakawa has become one of the foremost actors of the American scene and has earned a place on the honor roll of filmdom.

The intention of the family was to make him a Japanese naval officer, but young Hayakawa proved the old saying "that you can lead a horse to water but you cannot make him drink," by resolutely refusing to enter the navy, and steadfastly persisted in his desire to be an actor. This was because of the fact that an uncle of his, who was manager of one of the great Japanese theatres, fostered the boy's ambitions and allowed him at a very early age to make his appearance in the company of the famous Madame Yacco, the Japanese Bernhardt.

Touring with madame Yacco in the United States, young Hayakawa became an enthusiastic admirer of America and Americans, making special study of our theatres, literature and motion pictures.

Deciding that his English needed reinforcing, Hayakawa studied at the University of Chicago for several terms, there meeting an old childhood friend, Tsuru Aoki, a diminutive Japanese actress whom he had seen in madam Yacco's company at his uncle's theatre in Tokio.

The two became fast friends and soon after the end of their course at college, were married and went to Hollywood, California, where they live at present in one of the most attractive bungalows in that city of charming homes. They are familiar figures walking or motoring through the city and have a host of loyal friends there besides the thousands who follow them on the screen.
