Notice is hereby given to the Legal voters of School District No. 77 of Marion County, State of Oregon, that a school meeting of said district will be held at Stayton High school, on the 17th day of June 1918 at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax.
