Official

Portland, Ore., June 24—All persons who can give information in regard to any draft registrant whose status is affected by the work or fight regulations, which becomes effective July 1, are particularly requested by the War Department to do so.

In fact, the regulations make it the duty of all citizens to report at once all facts which may come to their knowledge concerning registrants who are idle, or who are engaged in a non-productive occupation or employment. This report should be made to the nearest local draft board.

Persons writing or giving this information in person need have no fear their names will be revealed, for the information will be regarded in this sense as strictly confidential.

Under the head of "idlers," who will receive scant consideration from the local boards in their re-classification of such registrants who decline to enter a useful occupation of employment, the Government lists such occupations as "gamblers of all descriptions and employes of race tracks and bucket shops, fortune tellers, clairvoyants, palmists and the like."

And here are the regulation defining non-productive occupations or employment:

"The employment or engagement of any able-bodied registrant of military age in any of the following occupations or employments is not sufficiently effective in the present emergency, to justify the postponement of his call into military service, notwithstanding he may have a late number and notwithstanding he may have been placed in Class II, III or IV on the ground of dependency; and all registrants engaged as follows are to be considered by local boards and district boards as engaged in non-productive occupations or employments:

"Persons engaged in the serving of food and drink, or either, in public places, including hotels and social clubs;

"Passenger-elevator operators and attendants; and door men, footmen, carriage openers and other attendants in clubs, hotels, stores, apartment houses, office buildings and bath houses;

"Persons, including ushers and other attendants, engaged and occupied in and in connection with games, sports, and amusements, excepting actual performers in legitimate concerts, operas or theatrical performances;

"Persons employed in domestic service;

"Sales clerks and other clerks employed in stores and other mercantile establishments."

(1) That you be required to set forth the nature and extent of your claim or claims in, on, or to the following described real property, to-wit:

Beginning at the most southerly southeast corner of the John M. Prichard D. L. C. in Township 9 South, Range 1 West, of the Willamette Meridian; thence north 7.40 chains to the re-entrant corner of the above claim; thence west parallel with the south boundary of said claim 13.51 chains; thence south 7.40 chains to the south boundary of said claim; thence east 13.51 chains to the place of beginning, and containing 10 acres more or less.

(2) That all adverse claims which you or either of you may have been determined by a decree of said court and that by said decree it be declared and adjudged that you have no right, title, estate, lien, or interest whatsoever in law or in equity, in, on, or to said real property or any part thereof, and that the title of plaintiffs to said premises is a good and valid title in fee simple.

(3) That you will be forever enjoined and debarred from asserting any claim, right, title, estate, lien, or interest whatsoever in, on, or to said real property or any part thereof adversely to plaintiffs, and that plaintiffs may have judgment against said defendants or such of said defendants as shall appear herein for their costs and disbursements incurred in this suit and for such other further relief as may seem just and equitable.

This summons is served upon you by publication thereof in the Stayton Mail, a newspaper published weekly in Marion County, Oregon, by order of Hon. Geo. G. Bingham, Judge of the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for the Third Judicial District. Dated this 2nd day of May, 1918. The first publication to be on the 9th day of May, 1918, and you are required to appear and answer said complaint on or before the 20th day of June, 1918.
