Somewhere in France, August 10, 1918.

Dear Papa:—  
Received yours of June 25th a few days ago and very glad to hear that you are still improving. You should put in as much time as possible at the springs, as they will do more good than all the doctors. Would like to be there with you for a while, but no chance this summer. May be next summer we can take a trip. I hope so. We are camping out now, but not much of a pleasure trip. Have been moving around quite often lately and am seeing France. Harvest is nearly over here and think that they had pretty good crops. In places I saw some of the best wheat I have ever seen. But some of the country is very poor, low and swampy and looks like it is good for nothing. Hope your crops turn out good there and that there is plenty of help. The women, children and old men do the work here and they put in very long hours at that. Once in a while you see a French soldier helping them, but not as a rule.

Got a card from Hugh, who said he was trying for a commission. I hope he gets it, for I think he would make a good officer. I would like to be under him anyway, and as far as C. E. work goes he is as good as any of them and better than a whole lot. You can't tell by looking at a man what he will be like under fire, and it don't take long to find out. I was sure surprised in a few.

I don't think the government sends out insurance policies, just a card saying that the insurance has been taken out, so think you have all you will get from the n. Sure wish I had some of the cherries, as we get very little fruit of any kind.

Hay fever has not bothered me any this summer, but I wouldn't want to live here at that.
