
cup corn meal teaspoon salt 4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder

PRESIDENT APPEALS TO **VOTERS OF COUNTRY**

My Fellow Countrymen:

The congressional elections are at hand. They occur in the most critical period our country has ever faced or is likely to face in our time. If you have approved of my leadership and wish to continue me to be your unembarrassed spokesman at home and abroad, I earnestly beg that you will express yourselves unmistakably to that effect by returning a Democratic majority to both the senate and the house of representatives.

I am your servan and w'll accept our judgment with a said, but my power to administe. ... preat trust assigned me by the constitution would be seriously impaired should your judgment be adverse and I must frankly tell you so because so many critical issues depend upon your verdict. No scruple of taste must, in grim times like these, be allowed to stand in the way of speaking the plain truth.

The leaders of the minority in the

present congress have unquestionably been pro-war, but they have been antiadministration. At almost every turn since we entered the war they have sought to take the choice of policy and the conduct of the war out of my hands and put it under the control of instrumentalities of their own choosing. This is no time either for divided counsel or divided leadership. Unity of command is as necessary now in civil actions as it is upon the field of battle. If control of the house and senate should be taken away from the party now in power, an opposing majority could assume control of legislation and oblige all action to be taken amid 'contest and ob-

The return of a Republican majority to either house of congress would moreover, certainly be interpreted on the other side of the water as a repudiation of my leadership. Spokesmen of the Republican party are urging you to elect a Republican congress in order to back up and support the president, but even if they should in this way impose on some incredulous voters on this side of the water, they would impose on no one on the other side. It is well understood there, as well as here, that the Republican leaders desire not so much to support the president as to control him The people of the allied countries with whom we are associated against Germany are quite familiar with the significance of elections. They would find it very difficult to believe that the voters of the United States had chosen to support their president by electing to congress a majority controlled by those who are not in fact in sympathy with the attitude and action of the ad-

I need not tell you, my fellow countrymen, that I am asking your support of a political party, but for the sake of the nation itself, in order that its inward unity of purpose may be evident to all the world. In ordinary times I would not feel at liberty to make such an appeal to it. In ordinary times divided counsels can be endured without permanent hurt to the country.

But these are not ordinary times. If in these critical days it is your wish to sustain me with undivided minds, I beg that you will say so in a way which it will not be possible to misunderstand either here at home or among our associates on the other side of the sea. I submit my difficulties and my hopes to you.
