HAS NARROW ESCAPE

British Airman Goes Through Exciting Experience.

Tail of His Machine Shot Off While Flying at 16,000 Feet Over Ostend.

London.—A British airman flying a powerful machine at 16,000 feet over Ostend recently had the machine's tail shot off by the direct hit of a shell, a very unusual occurrence.

The machine turned upside down, out of control, and the pilot was thrown out of his seat. By some inexplicable maneuver he managed to clamber onto the bottom of the fuselage of the machine astride of which he sat as if he was riding a horse.

Though the machine was out of control, owing to the loss of its tail planes, yet by moving forward and backward he so managed to balance it that it glided steadily downward, although it was upside down.

He successfully brought it across the German lines and came safely to within a few hundred feet of the ground. Then he crashed and was injured, but is now recovering in hospital.

When it is considered that this incident occurred at a height of 16,000 feet, over hostile territory, and that during the airman's terribly precarious ride he was subject to anti-aircraft fire, and liable to the attack of hostile scouts, it is not too much to say that his is a record achievement.

Recently another airman was shot down, out of control, from 12,000 feet, and fell, fluttering like a leaf toward the ground. At a height of 9,000 feet he fainted. Shortly afterward he came to, and found himself in the machine upside down in a marsh, unhurt.

London.—An American doughboy is to be immortalized in a statue that will typify America and the part she is taking in the war.

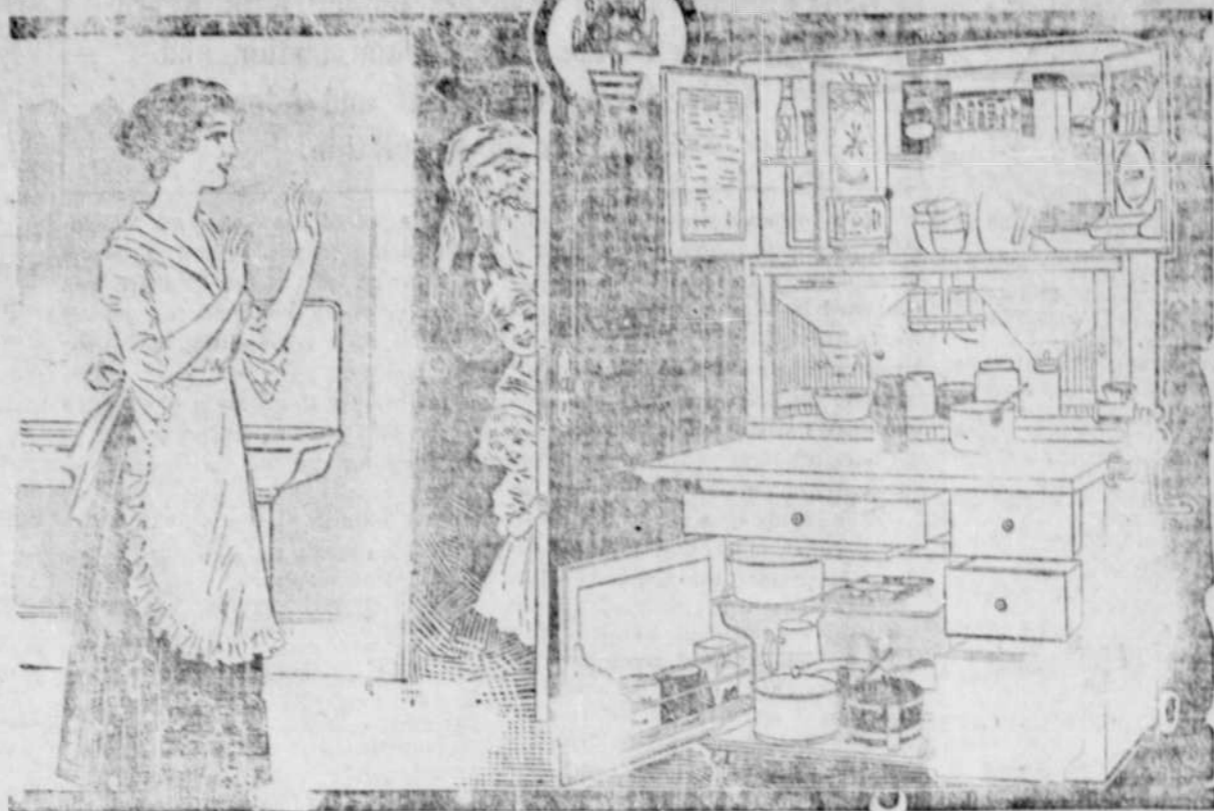
Jacob Epstein, private and noted sculptor, is seeking among the wounded Americans in English hospitals for a subject as a model from which to work out his conception.

Library Chief Says Books Keep Yank Soldiers Out of Trouble Overseas.

New York.—Declaring that the "leisure hour of the American overseas is the hour of greatest moral peril," and that good reading does much to keep lonely soldiers straight, Dr. M. L. Rainey, field manager of the American Library association, has reported to the New York state branch how soldiers, sailors and social workers have been provided with good reading matter. Doctor Rainey said that in ten months the association has established 42 libraries for the army and stocked them with 600,000 books and 2,000,000 magazines, all of which had been contributed. The working force consisted of 318 persons, one-third of whom served without pay.

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
