M. A. Redding, of Montana, offers the following remedy for the cure of pneumonia and the "flu." It is very simple and can be used in any home. Saturate a ball of cotton as large as a one inch marble with spirits of alcohol, and three drops of chloroform to each ball of cotton. Place it between the patient's teeth and let him inhale the fumes in deep, long breaths for fifteen minutes and repeat the operation as directed for twenty-four times. The result will be that the lungs will expand to their normal condition and in 24 hours the patient will be out of danger. In 48 hours he will be cured although weak. The cotton should be changed twice in fifteen minutes.
