NEW TELEPHONE RATES EFFECTIVE JANUARY 21

The new telephone rates announced some time ago by Postmaster General Burleson, went in effect on the 21st of

January. The following is an example of how the method is applied. If you can make anything out of it all right.

Assuming the air line distance between toll points to be more than 144 miles, but not more than 152 miles, the following initial period rates for service under the various classes offered would apply:

"Station to station" rate....	\$1.00
Completed "person to person" rate.....	1.25
Completed "appointment" rate.....	1.50
Completed "messenger call" rates.....	1.50
Plus messenger charges	
Report charge.....	.25
Rate between 8:30 p.m. and 12 midnight, "station to station" service only.....	.50
Rate between 12 midnight and 4:30 a.m., "station to station" service only.....	.25
