Paris, France, 1-26-1919.

Dear Mother:—Thought I would  
drop a few lines.

Well, this finds me as well as  
ever, and I hope it finds you the  
same.

Well, today makes about a  
month here in Paris. I have  
seen about one-quarter of the  
city and expect to see all there is  
of interest during the rest of my  
stay here.

The weather here is about the  
same as in Portland, Oregon, but  
Portland is the best city.

You have heard a lot of Paris  
being the prettiest city going.  
Well, it maybe, but I don't think  
much of it.

I have given up hopes of being  
home before June, and have not  
received any mail for some time.  
—Am anxious to come back home  
since the war is practically over.  
The land of Liberty, that's the  
land I love and no other.
