U. S. WAR COST SMALLER THAN BRITISH BILL

Despite Armistice, Disbursements Have Slackened Off Little.

Twenty-one months of our war with Germany cost the United States \$26,356,000,000, the treasury department calculates. Although huge munitions and other contracts have been cancelled, disbursements have slackened off little. Manufacturers are now presenting their bills and receiving payments for materials delivered months ago in the heat of the struggle.

Included in the enormous total of \$26,356,000,000 is the sum of \$7,875,000,000 loaned to our Allies. When we began lending to our Allies, the government contemplated turning over to them about \$500,000,000 a month but actual loans ordinarily ran around \$380,000,000 monthly.

Of the total war bill about \$16,000,000,000 have been raised so far by the Liberty Loans. The fact that we have not covered our war debt is the reason for the Victory Liberty Loan. In other words we haven't paid for the job.

The cost of the war to Great Britain was \$40,640,000,000. Germany is out \$28,750,000,000 exclusive of indemnities the Allies may impose.
