CONDITIONS OF THE VICTORY LOAN ESSAY CONTEST

Every school child, except those in the first and second grades, is asked to compete. The essays of children in the third and fourth grades should be not longer than 200 words. The essays of children in the fifth and sixth grades should be not longer than 400 words. Essays of children in the seventh and eighth grammar grades and the four years of the high school should be not less than 600 words nor more than 1000. Each teacher will select the best essay in her room. Each principal will select the best essays in the competing grades

in her building. Each county superintendent will select the ten best essays, one from each competing grade, in his county. Thus, by elimination, we will have ten best essays from each county in the state.

These ten essays, and these only, should be sent to the Essay Contest Section, Victory Liberty Loan, 329 Stark Street, Portland, Oregon.

Every child, whose essay is included in the ten from its county will receive a silver pin.

The ten best essays in Oregon, one from each competing grade, will then be selected by the committee. The authors of these will receive gold medals.

Of the ten best essays there will be one which will be adjudged the very best of all—the best essay in the state. The winner of this distinction will receive, in addition to the gold medal, a GENUINE PRUSSIAN OFFICER'S HELMET which has been given by the War Department for this purpose.
