

WORK FOR DISABLED

Technical Agriculture Offers Thousands of Positions.

Serve as Stepping Stones to Higher Promotions and Better Compensation.

Washington.—Technical agriculture offers thousands of positions as associates, assistants, helpers, extension workers and county agents, and this work is particularly suitable for retrained, disabled men, according to a statement issued by the federal board for vocational education.

These positions serve as stepping stones to higher promotions and better compensation soon in the agricultural colleges, experiment stations, agricultural extension service and in state agricultural movements. These institutions and employments lost thousands of men from their student bodies, their faculty and their staffs. Hundreds of men formerly agricultural county agents will never return to those occupations. These places were temporarily filled by unprepared substitutes who will be replaced by trained men as rapidly as possible.

The experience abroad, wherein opportunity was given to study the intensive and scientific agriculture of France and other countries, has greatly stimulated interest in these lines, and disabled men with a background of agricultural experience are manifesting keen interest in training for the lines mentioned. Many others who, by reason of their disabilities, are compelled to equip themselves in other lines, and preferably for out-of-door occupations, are also manifesting a keen desire to take up the specialized branches of agriculture in the training offered by the federal board.

Counting By Millions

Judge Arnold: "Spare the Rod and Spoil the Child"

CHICAGO.—Raymond Fromm, a big, strapping boy of sixteen years, got a good, healthy, old-fashioned, behind-the-woodshed whipping in the juvenile court chambers the other day by order of Judge Victor P. Arnold. The court commanded the father to do the job. "And I want to see it," Judge Arnold added as he led them into his chambers.

The boy had been spared and spoiled 16 years. "That's long enough," said the court. "Now, the best thing his father can do is give him a sample of what he should have had years ago."

Raymond took a seven-passenger automobile in front of 5800 Washington boulevard and was arrested. The car belonged to Elmer C. Bye. Albert Fromm, the boy's father, lives at 2640 Iowa street, and is an upstanding citizen, with one fault—he never thrashed Raymond. He hadn't the heart.

"It's punishment from your father or it's St. Charles school for you," Judge Arnold told Raymond. The lad was sure the whipping, even though close at hand, was nothing to 16 months at St. Charles. The decision was fairly easy.

Mr. Fromm, once nerved to the ordeal, seemed to set his jaw as he disappeared with the erring son. Everybody smiled except Raymond, who came out with a red face, eyes brimming tears and evidently a chastened spirit.



New Subway Alarm.

A tunnel of the Metropolitan railway, in London, which much of the time is filled with smoke or steam, has been equipped for its 2,200 feet of length with an iron tube for giving notice of the approach of trains, the tubes to be agitated so as to produce a noise, by means of treadles, and being so arranged that it can be out of service when no men are at work in the tunnel. It was found that horns or gongs could be heard not over 700 feet in a clear atmosphere and a much shorter distance when the atmosphere was filled with smoke or steam. A galvanized iron tube, of about three-quarters inch internal diameter, is hung along the side of the tunnel at the height of a man's head, and as trains approach or enter the tunnel this pipe is caused to vibrate in such a way that it can be heard throughout its length.

Paris.—The home of the famous French author, Honoré de Balzac in the Rue Raynouard at Passy has been reopened as an artists' center. The house had been sadly neglected, but has been restored to present the appearance it had in Balzac's time, with its vestibule painted blue and the original oak carvings and dark red tapestries decorating the apartment where Balzac wrote his masterpieces.

On the table stands the big china coffee pot from which the author was wont to refresh himself, for Balzac was a mighty drinker of coffee. Old wood cuts and original printing proofs adorn the walls. In the garden the vine that Balzac tended still grows and his beloved lilacs have been replanted there.

In one room there is still the trap-door through which Balzac used to disappear when importunate creditors called.
