Adoption of a National Highways Policy Likely

THE adoption of a national highways policy by the United States Chamber of Commerce at its annual convention, coupled with recent announcements by Senator Penrose, the next chairman of the senate finance committee, and Senator Bankhead, retiring chairman of the senate committee on post offices and post roads, that they stand for national highways tremendously strengthened and probability of passage of the Townsend bill at the extra session of congress," says David Jamison, president of the American Automobile association.

"A national highway system can be kept within 3 per cent of the total mileage of highways in the United States and still serve our fundamental needs. To make this point clear it may safely be stated that a zone, ten miles in width and 75,000 miles in length, will reach more than 85 per cent of the population of the United States, more than 85 per cent of the taxable real estate and more than 55 per cent of the tonnage of farm products.

"Such a system would protect with a military highway having an aggregate length of about 10,800 miles our Atlantic, Gulf, Mexican, Pacific and Canadian borders; would give access to our national forests, our national parks and open up much of the public domain not now easily accessible, and would afford trunk-line routes for parcel post in the territories where this form of transportation is most intensive in character."

He also says that if as a condition to the building of the national highways in each state a construction of an equivalent mileage of state highways should be required, this would add 75,000 miles of state highways.

This, with the national system, would aggregate 150,000 miles
