Washington .- More than \$1,500,000 will be saved by the farmers this year as a result of the action of the government in making available at reduced prices large quantities of pitrate for

After the armistice was signed the yard near Salem. war department released to the department of agriculture 111,000 tons of nitrate produced during the war for use in explosives. To this quantity is added 40,000 tons received from Chile by the agricultural department, too late for distribution last year.
