### GAVE IDEA TO INVENTORS

Timothy Alden's Typesetting Machine First of the Kind to Be Placed on the Market.

Timothy Alden was born in Barnstable, Mass., 36 years ago. He was the first man to invent a typesetting machine. In his boyhood Timothy was apprenticed to a printer. He was a born inventor, and almost from his first day in the printing office he began to think of plans for improving the various processes connected with the typographical art. He invented several machines connected with printing before he turned his attention to the mechanical setting of type. After several years of study he produced his first model of a typesetting machine in 1846. This machine consisted of a horizontal rotating wheel with type coils on its circumference making receivers rotate with it to pick out the type fit the proper places. This appliance was ingenious, but it effected no improvement over hand composition. Timothy Alden died in Boston in 1858, and his brother, Henry, later made several improvements in the machine. Timothy Alden's machine had the merit of setting others to thinking about the same problem, with the result that hand composition is rapidly becoming a thing of the past.

**Up Among the Birds.**  
In spite of the difficult and exacting task, a few aviators have found opportunity to observe and record the height at which various migratory birds are accustomed to fly. Thus, from French soldiers of the air it is learned that swallows have been observed to maintain an average altitude of 700 yards and wild ducks one of 1,800 yards, and that green plovers have been seen at a height of 2,150 yards. Incidentally it may be mentioned that the ducks were moving at a speed of 62½ miles an hour when flying upward, and 60 miles an hour when flying horizontally. Another aviator when flying at 9,500 feet saw swallows 62½ above him. And another, who made his observations at a height of 6,000 feet during a heavy bombardment, with anti-aircraft shells bursting all about him, says he saw 200 golden plovers, perhaps driven higher than usual by the fact that the vicinity was an unpleasant belt to cross.—Youth's Companion.

### U. S. SAVES FARMERS MILLIONS

End of War Releases 151,000 Tons of Nitrates to Be Sold at Cost for Fertilizer.

Washington.—More than \$1,500,000 will be saved by the farmers this year as a result of the action of the government in making available at reduced prices large quantities of nitrate for fertilizer.

After the armistice was signed the war department released to the department of agriculture 111,000 tons of nitrate produced during the war for use in explosives. To this quantity is added 40,000 tons received from Chile by the agricultural department, too late for distribution last year.

Under authority of the food control act the nitrate is to be sold at cost and already, says a statement by the department, farmers have taken up the full 151,000 tons in orders ranging from 250 pounds to 300 tons.
