The daylight saving change has reduced the time that people use electric light in summer, thus increasing the difference between the summer and winter bills. This should especially be borne in mind this fall. The October bill will show a marked increase over September.

In June, the average use of Electric Light in residences is  $1\frac{55}{100}$  hours per day.

In December, the average use of Electric Light in residences is  $6\frac{85}{100}$  hours per day.

Therefore, the average use of Electric Light in the home is nearly four and one-half times as great in December as in June.
