CALIFORNIA LABOR BODY BACKS THRIFT

California State Federation Recommends Government Agent in Each Union.

Bakersfield, Cal.—Recognizing thrift as an economic weapon making for independence of the workingman, the California State Federation of Labor, in its twentieth annual convention here, adopted resolutions introduced by President Daniel C. Murphy endorsing the government's 1919 thrift and war savings stamp campaign and recommending to all affiliated local unions in the state the appointment of a thrift agent with a revolving fund adequate to handle thrift and war savings stamps and treasury savings certificates. The vote on the resolution was unanimous.

After pointing out that thrift and war savings stamps afford "many of small earnings a safe, sound and guaranteed method of government investment of hard earned savings," the resolution memorialized federal authorities to perpetuate the government's war savings institution, stating that it has "stimulated freedom of action and independence on the part of wage earners."

President Murphy of the Federation said: "I feel that the continuation of the teaching and practice of thrift by the government is of vital importance to the wage earners of the nation. At this time particularly it is important that every wage earner help to bring exorbitant prices to a normal level by saving every cent he can, thus cutting down the demand for luxuries and permitting the use of the capital saved for the production of necessities."
