AMERICANS BIGGEST USERS OF RAILROADS; SERVICE HERE FAR OUTSTRIPS EUROPE

Even with the added support provided by the higher educational relief bill, the Oregon Agricultural College would be spending \$70 less per student per year than the Agricultural Colleges of Michigan, Iowa, Indiana, Kansas and Washington, taken as examples. This estimate is based on the present attendance at O. A. C. without allowance for increase although attendance has increased 148 per cent in the past 7 years, while income from the state in the same period has increased less than 4 per cent. The State University is equally low in its expenditures in comparison with other state institutions.

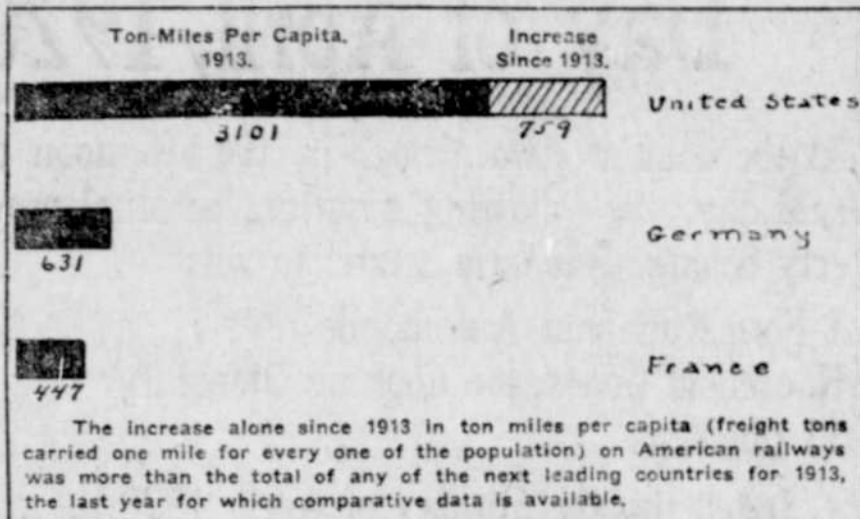
The railways of the United States in point of actual railway service lead the world. Americans buy more railway service, and a greater amount of transportation is supplied and used in the United States than in any other country.

According to statistics prepared by the Bureau of Railway Economics, the ton miles per capita carried by United States railroads in 1913 were almost five times the ton miles per capita carried by Germany, which was second to the United States in this respect. The ton miles per capita carried by the United States railroads in 1913 were 3,101. In Germany the ton miles per

capita carried by the railroads were 631 and in France 447.

Since 1913 the increase in ton miles per capita carried by the railroads of the United States was more than the total carried by either of the two other countries in that year. In comparison with the total of 631 carried by the railroads in Germany and the total of 447 carried by the railroads in France the increase carried by the railroads in the United States since 1913 was 759 ton miles per capita.

The chart below shows the transportation supplied in the United States, Germany and France in 1913 and the increase in railroad service in the United States since 1913.



Pomona granges in Lincoln, Polk and Multnomah counties have endorsed the relief bill for higher education, which will appear on the ballot on May 21 as the Higher Educational Tax Act. The Eastern Oregon Cattle Feeder's Convention, The Oregon Dairy Council, and various other groups of farmers and stockmen have endorsed the bill. Endorsements are beginning to be announced from American Legion Posts. The president of the State Federation of Labor has issued a letter to all labor unions urging indorsement. These approvals, together with the numerous ones from chambers of commerce, civic bodies, and women's clubs, show the widespread interest in preserving the freedom and equality of higher education.

Chicago, March.—William Cooper Procter, national chairman of the Wood campaign, announces that from reports received from members of his committee who were with Wood at St. Louis, he confidently expects at least 18 of the 36 votes from Missouri will be for Wood on the first ballot. Among those votes will be that of David Procter of Kansas City, who won his place on the delegation after a hard fight with the anti-Wood forces. The election of Procter is considered a great victory for the Wood policies, for which the Kansas City Star has stood steadfastly for many years.
