PASTOR DEFENDS SOLDIER

Tells Lowden Rooter Leonard Wood's
Reputation Was Gained as a
Civil Administrator.

Chicago, April 10.—Rev. Jesse B.
Burkhardt, pastor of the First Con-
gregational church of Boreford, S. D.,
has made public his reply to Johnston
Myers of 2320 Michigan avenue, Chi-
cago, who wrote asking him to sup-
port Governor Lowden for president.
After enumerating the strong points of
Governor Lowden, Mr. Myers asks:
"Are we not tired of militarism?" In
his reply Mr. Burkhardt says:
"Since in the whole of his thirty-
odd years in service General Wood
has never led more than a brigade in
battle and never engaged in anything
that in this war would be called a bat-
tle. I cannot feel weary of his slaugh-
tering. And when I think that the
work for which we remember him and
other nations honor him was that of a
civilian administrator, I feel that your
insinuation is unfair and unworthy."

WOOD FAVORS INDIANA WOMEN

His Managers Indorse Legislation
That Will Give Them the
Right to Vote.

Chicago, April 10.—District man-
agers of the Leonard Wood campaign
in Indiana have gone on record in
favor of giving the women of their
state the right to vote in the primary
May 4. The meeting was called for
the purpose of discussing this question
by Harry G. Hogan, Indiana manager,
and was attended by Frederick A.
Joss, vice chairman of the Wood na-
tional committee and national com-
mitteeman from Indiana. The meet-
ing also recommended that a special
session of the legislature be called
between now and the date of the pri-
mary to give women the ballot.

Plans for General Wood's visit to
the state late in April were discussed
and efforts will be made to persuade
him to spend a week in Indiana.

WOOD POPULAR WITH PEOPLE

New York Sun Poll in Massachusetts
Favors Him.

Chicago, April 10.—A poll conducted
by the New York Sun and Herald in
Massachusetts gives unmistakable evi-
dence of the fact that the people are
for Wood and that the politicians are
for Lowden.

ernor Coolidge, a favorite son, first
choice. Although Coolidge was given
first choice he has announced that he
will not be a candidate. Consequently
the mantle giving Massachusetts first
choice falls to Wood.

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
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
