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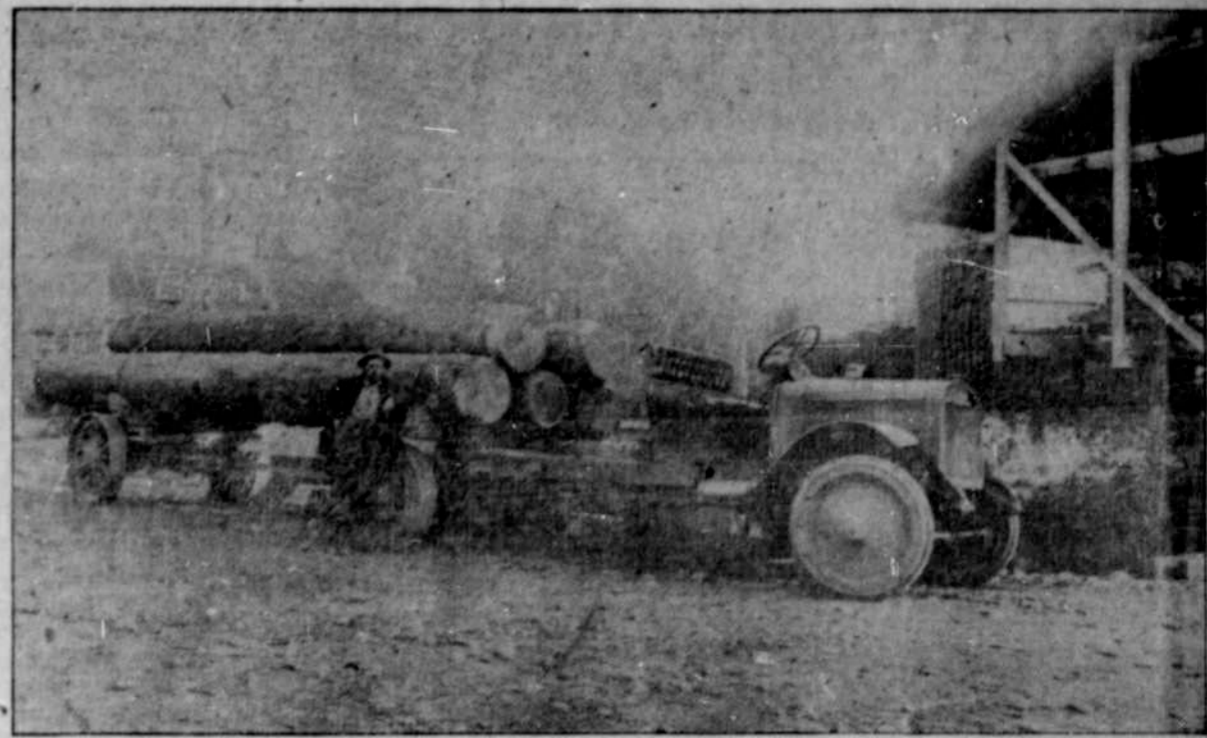
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KNOWS WHO KEPT HIM HOME

ME out of the war."



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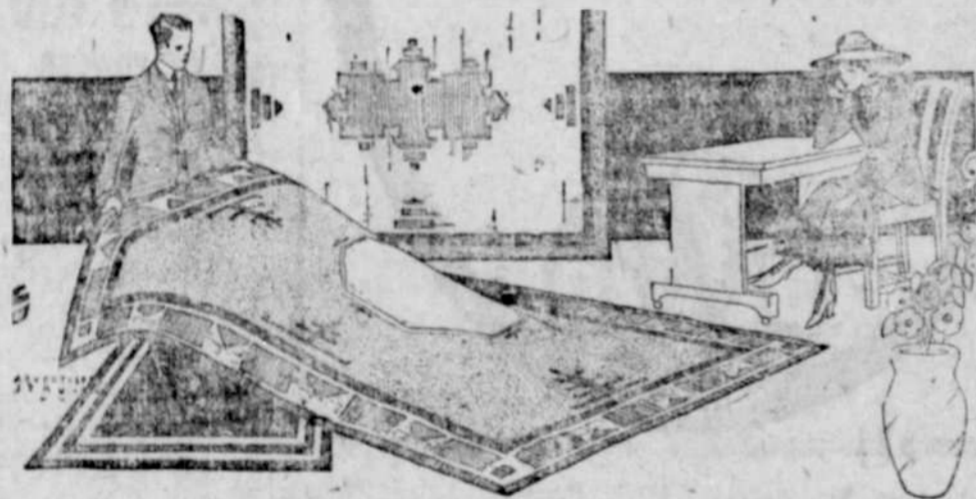

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**New Jersey to Send Five of Them to
Chicago Convention.**

Chicago, April 28.—Five delegates from New Jersey are already pledged to support Leonard Wood for the Republican presidential nomination and will go to the convention instructed for him, as they are unopposed in the primary. Pledges not to put up any candidates to oppose these five men have been given by the Essex county Republican committee.

Plans have already been made in New Jersey to enter a Wood man as candidate for delegate in every district where the presidential candidate refuses to pledge himself for Wood, and from the strength of Wood sentiment in the state, all 28 delegates to the convention will support the general.
