### Fenwick Newell at Chautauqua

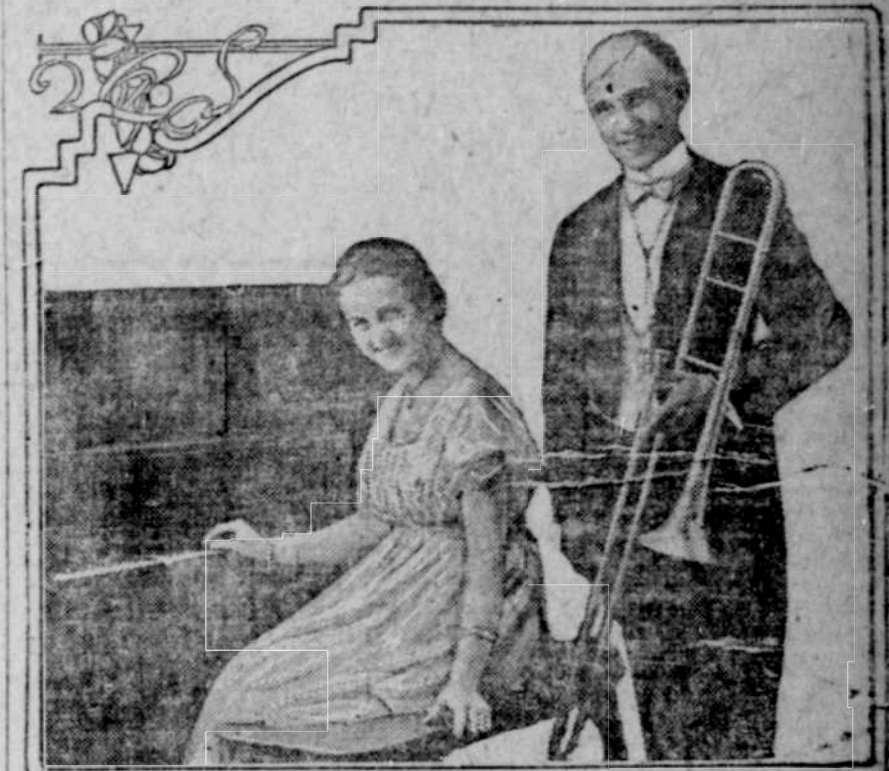
Prominent Tenor Comes on Second Day at Head of His Own Company
