A correspondent recommends the following simple remedy for headache—sick headache particularly. Cut a lemon in half and squeeze the juice into a tumbler. Function of an Alarm Clock.

Persons who doubt the existence of an English sense of humor should consider the following: Whether an alarm clock is a household requisite or an article of furniture caused a lengthy discussion in a British court recently, according to the Manchester Guardian. Giant Airplanes.

BANISH DEMON OF INSOMNIA

Physician Declares "Balm Sleep" May Be Obtained by Following Advice He Gives.

The other day a medical man, consulted by a patient who feared insomnia, instead of prescribing the expected drug, merely told his patient how to sleep. The threatened insomnia was banished, says London Answers.

One should lie on the right side—not because this affects the heart, but because it relieves pressure on the digestive organs. But the right side is not "a full right." There should be a slight tilt to the left, so that the right shoulder blade, and not just the shoulder, takes the weight.

The proper position is to elevate the feet three inches or so higher than the head and just to "crook" the legs slightly. Head pillows should not be used, or but just a small one. And that should come under the neck. Nature's pillow is the sleeper's own arm, curved.

Bed clothing should be just sufficient for warmth. Overweight or over-tightness—some sheets are tucked in much too tightly—induce restlessness, which may easily develop into insomnia, which is as much a habit as a disease.

Each individual has a nervous system which is his own and unlike any one else's. It is, therefore, advisable, in the case of persistent inability to sleep, to move the bedstead. Try an east-west position, instead of a north-south, or vice-versa.

The sleeping result may surprise you.

He Sells It Twice.

"Before any one of the department managers of a big western concern places any important new policy before the president for approval, he explains the plan in full to one of the other department heads, and obtains either his approval or his disapproval," says a writer in System, the Magazine of Business. "Then if his plan is approved and he takes it to the president for his O. K., the fact that the other department head has indorsed the plan makes it easier for the president to judge, without giving too much thought to the details. Furthermore, this method decreases the number of undesirable plans, that are brought to the president's office; frequently, when one manager presents his plan to another, he is shown why it is not practicable, or how it would conflict with some fundamental policy."

Birthplace of Famous Ships.

Many famous warships were built and launched at Portsmouth, N. H., the first being the 54-gun ship Paulkland of the English navy, launched in 1690. It was followed by the Red Rover, and by the American in 1749, all of the British navy. The first vessel of the continental navy launched there was the 32-gun Raleigh in 1775. The second was the Immortal Ranger, from whose deck John Paul Jones received the first salute to the Stars and Stripes on February 14, 1778. The private Congress, sunk by the Confederate ironclad Merrimack, and the Kearsarge, which sank the Confederate steamer Alabama off Cherbourg, France, were two other famous Yankee war vessels built at Portsmouth.
