Undoubtedly a strong candidate for nomination for district attorney is Walter E. Keyes. He is a capable and experienced lawyer and handles a large practice in this and adjoining counties. He can be depended upon to conduct the affairs of the office in an economical manner, in the interests of all the people. Under his administration there will be no useless cases crowding the docket at public expense and the people may look for fair and impartial treatment at his hands.

If W. C. Gauntt, of this city, is elected county superintendent of schools, which seems likely, Marion county schools will have a competent, conscientious man at their head. He has the education to fit him for the office and besides having taught for a number of years has made school work a careful study. Being unable on account of his duties as superintendent of the Stayton schools to make a thorough canvass of the county, he is obliged to depend considerably upon the help of his friends. Wherever he is known he will secure a big vote.

George G. Bingham of Salem is not saying as much about his candidacy for circuit judge as his friends are saying, but that he is going to be elected seems very probable. Indeed, his election is inevitable. Mr. Bingham is a strong campaigner for his friends, but his one weak point is in a lack of disposition to "toot his own horn." He is known to be a man of high honor, however, and this, together with his qualifications, will elect him, even though he makes no effort in his own behalf. Possibly he has not "more relatives than any other man in Oregon," but he has friends without number, and they will show their fidelity to the man of honor at the polls. —Silverton Tribune.
