Valuable Ore

The so-called "volcanic necks, chimneys, etc.," at the Black Eagle have been proven to be chimneys of high grade zinc and silver ore and thousands of dollars of this valuable ore has been thrown on the dump. The old management it is said, considered this ore valueless and threw hundreds of tons of it down the dump and the ore being peculiar to this country, has remained there undetected for the past three years until Mr. Barnes, who has recently opened a mine of such ore, happened along and recognized it.

The Crown people are jubilant over the discovery of a sphalerite ore worth \$147 per ton. Calamine, worth \$130 per ton has also been discovered. Specimen of copper ore taken from the upper workings lately, is expected to assay over \$200 per ton. —Scio Tribune.
