## The Drys are Victorious

From the latest election returns the "Bone Dry" amendment has carried by a large majority, in Oregon as soon as the votes are tabulated and certified to the governor by the Secretary of State all that will be necessary to make the law become effective will be a proclamation by the chief executive of the state that the amendment has carried. Owing to the fact that the amendment does not carry a penalty for violation of same it may be necessary for the governor to postpone issuing his proclamation until the legislature meets and provides a penalty for violators.

Prohibition sentiment is gaining ground fast in this country as four more states and Alaska was added to the dry column as a result of last Tuesday's election, this making 23 dry states in our union, and in many other states that are nominally wet a large percentage of their population is living in dry territory on account of the operation of the local option law. The Brewers Amendment in both Oregon and Washington was beaten by an overwhelming majority.

## Prospect For World Peace Bright.

In a speech recently made in London by Earl Grey, minister of foreign affairs of the British government, this great diplomat dwelt on the necessity of a world's peace league in the future.

This is a wonderful advance in the working out of the future peace of the world, for Lord Grey is the foremost man of the British empire in the field in which he works and has labored for many years including the administrations of Gladstone and Roseberry.

Now comes the news of a speech by Chancellor Bethmann-Hollweg of Germany, in the reichstag on Friday last, in which this leading statesman and diplomat of that empire declared that after the war Germany will cooperate in finding means for a lasting peace by the establishment of a world court.

More than this, the representative newspapers of Germany have endorsed this sentiment in favor of a world union for compelling peace.

There is a tremendous significance in the above facts.

The United States has already taken steps to forward this movement, under the leadership of former President Taft, who is president of the American Society for the Enforcement of World Peace. In fact, some of the leading men of this country have been the pioneers in this movement.

With Germany, Great Britain and the United States in accord in this great movement, no doubt France, Austria and Russia will willingly fall in line, and the other leading nations of the world will be obliged to come in accord, and will likely not need great persuasion.

This will be a new thing in the world.

It will no doubt be effective in the preservation of the world's peace for a long time after the exhaustions of the present great war; and, once it is put to the test, by the attempted breaking away of some power, and the use of the compulsive measures that will be provided for whipping that nation into line, there will be a prospect for the cessation of all wars in the world for all time.

So there is no more important movement than this in all the long record of history.—Oregon Statesman.

## Another Pioneer Passes Away.

Nicholas Lambert passed away with a stroke of paralysis on November 10, 1916. He was born in Ireland June 28, 1829, being 87 years 4 months and 13 days old. He crossed the Atlantic Ocean at the age of 14 years, went to Wisconsin where he lived for two years. He then went to New Orleans, where he lived for a number of years and while there married Miss Bridget Coulon. They moved to Missouri in 1858 where they resided until 1875 when they came to Oregon and located on his farm northeast of Sublimity where he resided till September 23, 1915, when he went to live with his son P. H., where he stayed until his death. He was a lifelong Democrat, having fought for the south in the Civil War.

His wife died October 23, 1876. Several years later he married Mrs. Elvira Branch who died August 12, 1907. He is survived by six children, N. J. Lambert of Grandview, Oregon, Mrs. Mary Tate, Sublimity, Ore., P. H. Lambert, Kingston, Ore., Mrs. Kate Gourley, Tacoma, Wn., L. S. Lambert, Stayton, Ore., and Miss Frances Lambert, of Los Angeles, California.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Lockhart at the Hobson and Whitney cemetery at 2 o'clock October 12. The pall bearers were A. D. Gardner, W. H. Hobson, T. J. Hunt, Lee Tate, Geo Spaniol, Wm VanHandel, Byron Denny and Jos Heighberger. The large attendance and beautiful tokens of flowers showed the high esteem in which he was held by his neighbors and friends.

## Fair Play For Investor.

The state needs industries, pay rolls and development of its resources. Without these there can be no progress. To establish and operate industries and create pay rolls requires the investment of capital. To secure the investment of capital it is necessary to give reasonable assurance that a fair return will be earned on the investment.

Tearing down existing industries will never establish new ones.

The best assurance that can be given capital is the enactment of fair reasonable laws and by imposing only such regulations as are just and equitable.

Capital seeking investment will not locate in a state or a community where the existing industries are subjected to unfair burdens, either by taxation or through unwarranted restrictions. There has been a too general disposition to overlook the industrial and commercial benefits derived from the investment of capital. (Washington State Weekly.)
