#### Stayton has Good Water

A few weeks ago when W. A. Weddle was in Portland he was talking to the state health officer Dr. David V. Roberg and promised to send him some of Staytons drinking water for analysis, he brought home with him one of their sanitary bottles and filled it from his kitchen faucet and sent it to the doctor, who analysed it with the result stated in the following letter:

Portland, Feb. 17, 1917  
Mr. W. A. Weddle,  
Stayton, Ore.

Dear Sir:  
The examination of the sample of water submitted by you Feb. 12th showed a bacterial count of 75 per c. e., (15 drops) neither gas nor colon bacilli recovered upon 72 hours incubation. This, bacteriologically, is a good drinking water.
