Trio brings home Crystal Apples

Three Keizer educators were honored with Crystal Apple Awards at a ceremony Thursday, Nov. 5.

Holly Rushton, a library media assistant at Clear Lake Elementary School, Terra Schiffer, an English teacher at Claggett Creek Middle School, and Kevin Wise, a teacher at McNary High School, were among 10 recipients of the annual award presented by the Salem-Keizer Education Foundation.

Rushton was nominated by both co-workers and parents who sung her praises in every endeavor.

"Holly made the Clear Lake library a fun place for students learn and grow Everyfrom. thing she does is for the better of the students," wrote Julie Ortman, a Clear Lake school counselor.

Rushton has taken an active role in the annual Battle of the Books competition at the school, teaches reading during the annual Outdoor School, and volunteers with the Distinguished Young Women of Keizer Program for Mc-High Nary School junior girls.

Rushton was also called out for the ways in which she excites students about learning.

"I am honestly happy to say that (my son) frequently leaves me waiting in the car pick-up lane after school ... after yet another quick stop at the library. He knows that Mrs. Rushton will take the time to help him hunt down just the right book to satisfy his curiosity," wrote one parent.

Schiffer was cited repeatedly in nominations for her depth of caring.

"Whatever it is she is doing she does because, for her, the students and our school come first ... always," wrote colleague Noah Miles. "She knows that (our students) can be successful and she makes sure they know it too."


One former CCMS student also wrote in support of the nomination.


