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Mayor, two city councilors to run again; Koho done

Looking to run for a seat on the Keizer City Council this fall?

Odds are you'll have competition.

Mayor Cathy Clark and councilors Marlene Parsons and Kim Freeman all announced this week they are running again this fall.

On the other hand, Dennis Koho, the current council president and a former Keizer mayor, confirmed he won't be running again.

Clark will be running for a second two-year term as mayor. After eight years on council, Clark ran unopposed for mayor in 2014 to replace Lore Christopher, who served as mayor for 14 years.

Parsons emerged victorious in a three-way battle for her seat in 2012 and is running for a second term.

For Freeman, this will be her first campaign. She was appointed in the summer of 2013 to fill the vacancy created when Ken LeDuc resigned that spring. LeDuc had won his seat in 2012.

Koho returned to public office by winning an unopposed election bid in 2012, but has given hints several times since he would not be running for another term.

Clark released a statement Tuesday night announcing she is running for a second term.

"I ask for your continued support as I announce today that, in the November election, I plan to seek a second term as your mayor," Clark said. 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Want a marijuana shop? Be first

First come, first served. That's the gist of a ruling Keizer City Councilors made Monday night in regard to an amendment for the recreational marijuana retailer permit ordinance.

The ordinance was adopted by councilors at their previous meeting on Jan. 19. For the most part the city followed state guidelines and regulations.

There was one key difference, however.

"The ordinance requires a retailer to be located 1,000 feet from another retailer or a medical marijuana facility," city attorney Shannon Johnson said. "An issue was raised regarding the possibility that two or more persons may apply within the same general area. The question then is, which one is allowed the permit?"

Johnson said an application for the city permit cannot be submitted until the applicant has received state approval, meaning the Oregon Liquor
