

# Officer cleared in 7-Eleven shooting

A Keizer police officer who shot an armed robbery suspect was found justified in his actions by a grand jury last week.

Officer Esteban Perez was cleared in an officer-involved shooting stemming from a report of an armed robber at 7-Eleven, 5550 River Road N., June 26.

Perez arrived at the scene following a 911 call reporting an armed robbery with a knife. He located the suspect still on the premises and a confrontation arose that ended with Perez shooting Andy Lamar Gibson once. Perez was not harmed.

Gibson was transported to Salem Health for life-threatening injuries, but survived. He was discharged Thursday, July 7, and taken to the Marion County Correctional Facility where he is being held without bail.

The grand jury that cleared Perez also indicted Gibson on

charges of robbery, unlawful use of a weapon and attempted aggravated murder. He was scheduled for arraignment Friday, July 15, and has been provided a court-appointed attorney.

The Oregon State Police led the investigation at the direction of the Marion County District Attorney's Office. The grand jury took testimony from 13 witnesses, including detectives from OSP, civilian witnesses, and family members of Gibson. Evidence reviewed included photographs and video, scene diagrams and weapon evidence.

For Perez to be cleared, he had to reasonably believe that (1) the suspect was committing or attempting to commit a felony involving use of physi-

cal force; (2) that use of deadly force was necessary to defend himself or another person; (3) that under the totality of the circumstances existing at the time and place, the use of such force was necessary; and (4) that his life or personal safety was endangered under the circumstances.

Perez, 26, joined KPD in May 2015. Before that he was employed with the Gervais Police Department since 2010.

According to court records, Gibson was found guilty of stabbing his 19-year-old daughter in 2004. The Psychiatric Security Review Board oversaw his treatment and care for five years following the incident.

It was only the second Keizer officer involved shooting to occur in Keizer in the 32-year history of the department. The last occurred in September of 1989. The suspect who was shot in that incident also survived.

## City needs squad of volunteers

The City of Keizer needs volunteers to serve on the following committees:

- **Festival Advisory Board** (one vacancy) – serves in an advisory role to the City of Keizer by researching the feasibility for developing venues for events and festivals, streamlining policies and ordinances for potential events, developing an all-inclusive community calendar, and developing a marketing plan to enhance the use of Keizer-area facilities for events, festivals, and conferences. The Committee meets on the fourth Monday of February, April, July, September and November at 6 p.m.

- **Keizer Economic Development Commission** (three vacancies) – serves in an advisory capacity to the City Council and provides strategic planning recommendations regarding economic development. Meets quarterly at noon on the first Tuesday of February, May, August and November.

- **Keizer Points of Inter-**

**est Committee** (two vacancies) – identify, authenticate, and memorialize sites of interest located in the Keizer area. Sites to be identified may be historical, geographical, botanical, or unusual. Meets on the third Tuesday of each month at 5:30 p.m.

- **Planning Commission** (two vacancies) – assists the city council in land use decisions and recommendations regarding Keizer's future growth, development, and beautification. Meets on the second Wednesday of the month at 6 p.m. The planning commission has guidelines for composition and organization. The guidelines prohibit more than two members to be engaged principally in the buying, selling, or developing of real estate. In addition, planning commission members are required to file a statement of economic interest disclosure form with the Oregon Government Ethics Commission.

- **Public Art Commission** (one vacancy) – reviews, evaluates, selects, maintains,

and documents all artwork, public art, and public murals within the city. Meets on the fourth Tuesday of every month at 6 p.m.

- **Youth liaison/page** – opportunities are currently available to youth for service on various city committees for 2016-17.

Nominations are also being accepted for Volunteer of the Quarter.

Volunteer applications and Volunteer of the Quarter nominations are available at Keizer Civic Center, 930 Chemawa Road N.E., on the city website, www.keizer.org, or an application can be mailed to you by calling City Hall at 503-390-3700.

Applications/nominations must be received by Wednesday, Aug. 10, to be considered at the August 18 Volunteer Coordinating Committee meeting.

The Salem-Keizer School Board elected Nancy MacMorris-Adix chairperson and Paul Kylo vice chairperson for 2016-17 Tuesday.

Casting one negative vote for each was Chris Brantley, who said that as long as the board did not restore policies requiring directors to consult experts in certain areas regularly and to have regular strategies for communication with members of the community, he would not vote for any director who did not support those former policies.

The board also renewed the legal counsel status of Garrett, Hemann, Robertson, one of whose partners, Paul Dakopoulos, represents the firm in that capacity.

One grant came before the board and, as usual, was approved. It was \$415,787 from

the Oregon Department of Education for career technical education.
