Four McNary boys basketball players received all Mountain Valley Conference recognition for their outstanding play over the course of this season.

Boston Smith - 6'7" Post (senior): FirstTeam All-League

Smith was undoubtedly the best center in the conference. Despite facing double-teams nearly every game, he averaged 17 points and 6.5 rebounds per game. He also shot 68% from the field and was an incredibly dominant presence for the Celtics this season.

What his coach (Ryan Kirch) says:

"(Smith's) the league's best interior post player. Tough and physical. Boston forced every opponent to gameplan around him. Boston shot at an incredibility high percentage and is a willing passer when double teams came. Showed great toughness playing through significant knee pain the second half of the league season."

Nate Meithof - 6'4" Wing (sophomore): Second-Team All-League

Meithof was McNary's top backcourt player this year, averaging 17 points per game to go along with 4.5 rpg. He also averaged 3.5 assists and 2.5 steals per contest and was deadly beyond the arc for McNary, shooting

the three-ball at a 40 percent clip. Along with being a great offensive player, Meithof proved to be a valuable defensive asset throughout the year.

What his coach says:

"Long and lanky, Nate led us in nearly every statistical category. He has a great ability to get to the rim and draw fouls. Defensively, he was incredibly disruptive, get-

After being a contributor to the *Keizertimes* for nearly that two decades, G.I. Wilson has decided to retire from writing.


