Courthouse fined \$90K for COVID defiance

Oregon Occupational Safety and Health Administration officials have fined Courthouse Club Fitness \$90,000 for defying Gov. Kate Brown's COVID-19 order and remaining open throughout a current two-week freeze.

The penalty is the result of citations against each of the club's facilities — Courthouse has three locations in Salem and one in Keizer.

Courthouse owner John Miller previously posted on Facebook saying, "As a result of the harm done to our business from the first shutdown, we will not survive another closure."

Food collection set for KNOW baskets

The Keizer Network of Women (KNOW) will hold a drive-through food drive at Gubser Elementary School this weekend, 6 to 10 p.m. Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights, to benefit the group's annual Giving Basket program.

The food drive will be conducted with all COVID safety protocols in place including masks, social distancing and contactless collection.

In year's past the Giving Basket program has received food donations from the first

weekend's collection at the Miracle of Christmas Lights display in the Gubser neighbor. Due to COVID, this year the organizers of the light display will be accepting financial donations—via a QR code prominently displayed—for the Marion Polk Food Share only.

More than 180 local families with over 500 children in need will receive food and gift baskets this year from KNOW, a Keizer Chamber of Commerce organization.
