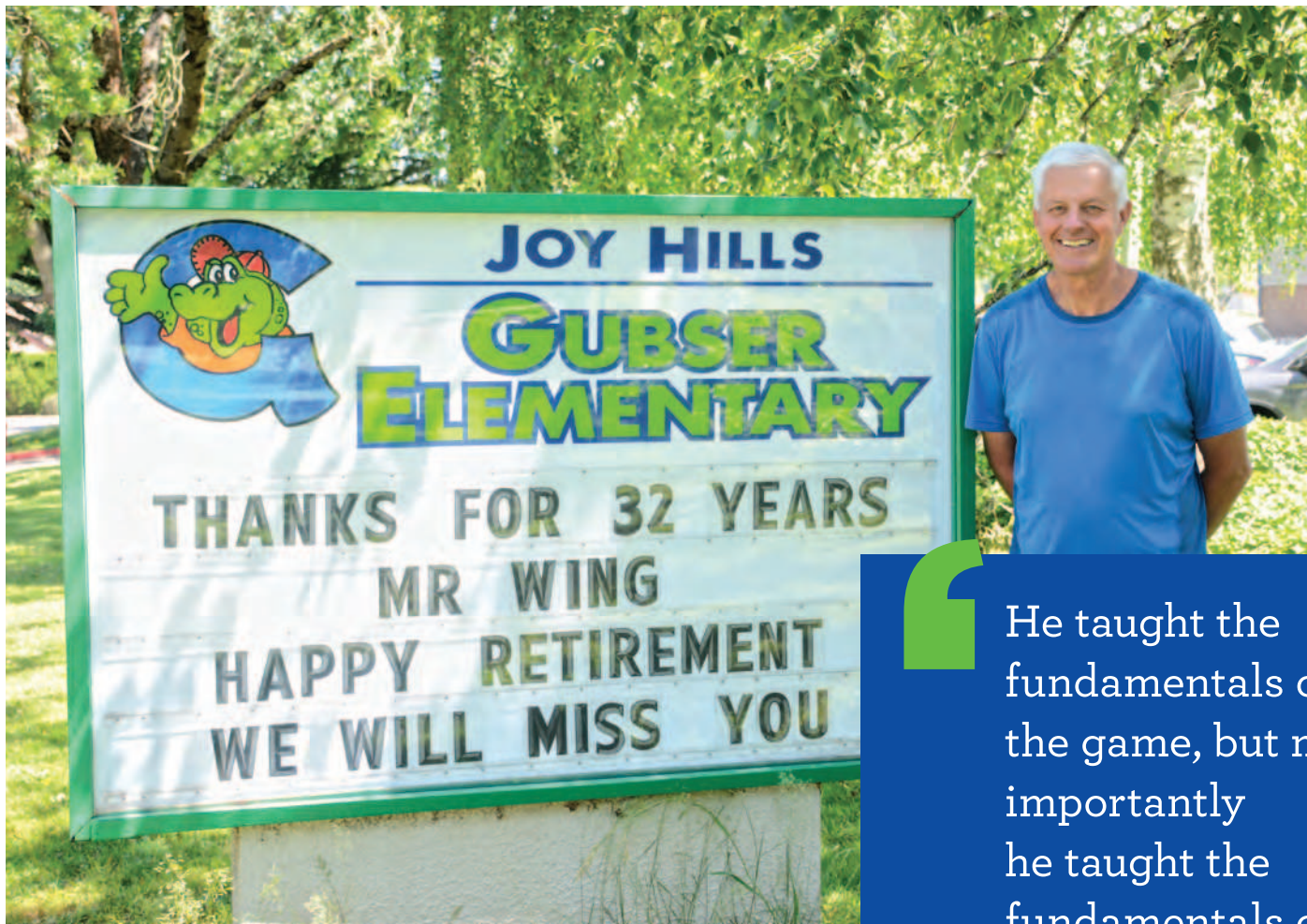


## Wing soars into retirement

## Two swimmers missing, presumed drowned

Two men are missing in separate swimming incidents that took place Saturday, June 26.

About 7 p.m., Yamhill County Sheriff’s Office Marine Patrol deputies were dispatched to a missing swimmer report near the Willamette Ferry. Upon arrival, deputies learned that Nasiruddin Shaik, 37, of Salem, was last seen struggling in the water off the Marion County river bank.

A contingent of law enforcement, fire/rescue personnel, and volunteers searched the waterway and river bank, utilizing multiple boats and a helicopter. The search was suspended about 10 p.m. until the following morning.

Fifteen minutes later, Yamhill County
