Franklin goalkeeper Ruby Swiericzuk made an incredible diving stop to knock the ball away, but Alfano was in perfect position to corral the rebound and net the put-back.

McNary remained incredibly aggres-

sive in the early stages of the first half, attempting six shots-on-goal in the first five minutes of the contest. But missed opportunities and a litany of impressive saves from Swiericzuk kept it a one-score

"She was a great keeper. Definitely have to give her a ton of credit," Brouse said.

Franklin didn't get their first real opportunity to tie the game until the 30th minute of the contest, but sophomore keeper Hannah Ferguson turned the Lightning away with a key save as the Celtics went to the break with the 1-0 lead.

While McNary was without an everyday keeper last season, Brouse believes that the Celtics have found their goalie in Ferguson, who recorded her second straight shutout.

"I have been super impressed with Hannah. I know she wants some more field time, and that was always the game plan, but she has been crushing it in the goal," Brouse said. "She has really been taking charge, I couldn't be more happy with her performance."

Along with her athleticism and spatial awareness as a keeper, Ferguson prides herself on communicating with her back line and trying to help put defenders in proper position.
