Among the hundreds of new Negroes that have come Oregon Journal on this subject. here to live are many who have never registered or voted. These people cannot guess how to go about registering. We need other Negroes to go and teach these people how it is done. Then you might ask, "Why should I try to teach them?"

Your answer is (1) It is a duty and a privilege to be able to help your fellow man. (2) The advantages to be gained by a large Negro vote are yours as well as his. (3) It will be an opportunity to meet and know the new neighbors you have here. (4) It will be an opportunity for cooperation among the Colored population here that has never been Meets every 2nd and 4th Monday known before.

As for a plan of operation, The Portland Inquirer has made application for the use of several buildings within the projects that most of the newcomers live in which to hold classes. These classes are to be held several times in order to reach as many people as possible, as quickly as possible. At these classes we will need people who already know how to register and vote. These people (YOU) who have had the experience can go through the process of registering so those who do not know will learn.

The Date and Time of these classes will of course be published in The Inquirer, but, due to the reluctance of our people to take an interest in their own welfare, it will be necessary for some workers to go around from house to house and get the people out to the classes.


Gentlemen: I have before me your August 18 edition of the Inquirer and I wish to commend you for your ag-

There will be plenty of work for lots of you. So go to a telephone now and give your name as a volunteer.

Following the classes, the Portland Inquirer is trying to secure the use of a large Auditorium in which to hold a mass meeting for final instructions. We could use some local talent, singers, musicians, dancers or what ever we can find as an offer of inducement to have as many Negroes present as space will permit.

There are those among the older residents who have an idea that all the new Negroes coming here are riff-raff, floaters and the like. Why not take this opportunity of finding out that there are a great many very responsible and intelligent people among the newcomers. That they can and will be very good neighbors and citizens if you try to make them welcome and feel that they "belong." There are a whole lot of holier-than-thous among YOU that if the truth was known, you would be no Angels in disguise. So get down off your high horses and give your brothers and sisters a lift, it is not their fault that they have been oppressed.

This can be the beginning of something very badly needed here among our people, a Civic League made up of the rank and file of all the Negroes. Here is your opportunity to lay aside petty grievances and start to cooperate with your race. We have got to unite as a race and stop bickering among ourselves in order to gain any of the many advantages that are ours as citizens. If you cannot give but an hour of your time, phone in your name to our office.
