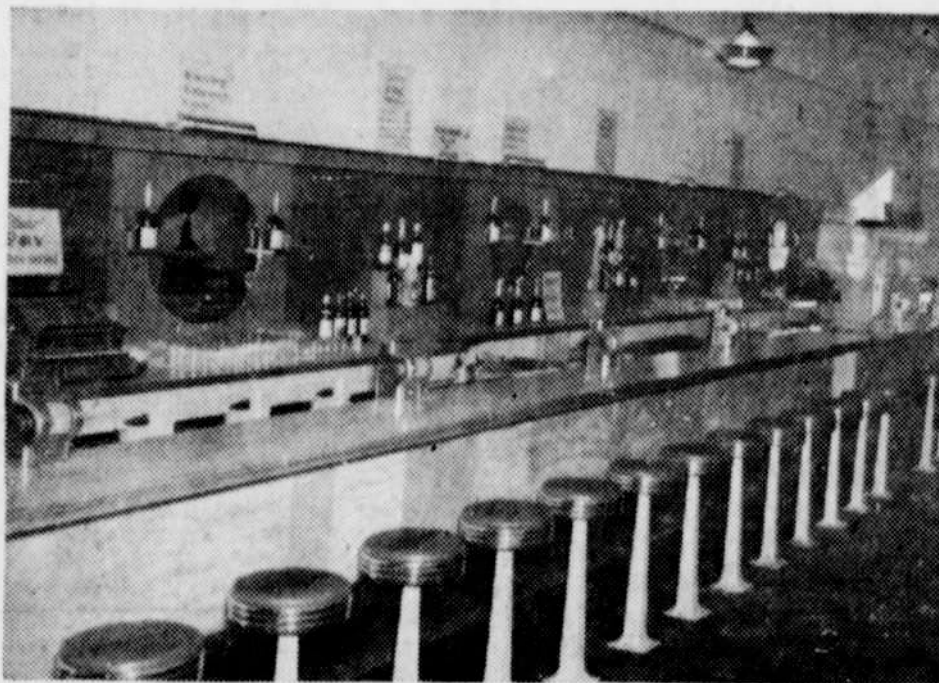
The 15th amendment to our Constitution says, "The right of the Citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States, or by any state on account of race, or color, or previous condition of servitude." It further states, "The congress of the United States shall have the power to enforce the provisions of this article by appropriate legislation."

We know of many flagrant violations of this right. By nature we are not a phlegmatic people, rather we are an indefatigable people, carrying on under the most exasperating circumstances, without wavering. Why not show that same spirit in our efforts to vote, in the choosing of our leaders, in casting out the demagogues who ostracise our race with their hyperbolic oratory, and paltry and sundry gifts?

By our individual persistence and cohesiveness at the polls we can break the tenacious hold of the serpents who would strangle our very existence. Let us not be gullible and susceptible, and be sent into paroxysms of hysteria by the predominance of hyper criticism, and the antipathy showered on our race. Show your resentment to this desolating outrage and the barbarous treatment accorded us and our soldiers, whose crimson blood is flowing without abatement all over the world, in defense of the ideal that we as American Negroes hope some day to enjoy.
