## **Negro Housing Aided by Builders**

The willingness of private capital to enter the field of building homes for Negroes was cited today by Administrator John B. Blandford, Jr., of the National Housing Agency as a long step forward toward a solution of the housing problem for Negroes.

Speaking before the Annual Conference of the National Urban League in Columbus, O., Mr. Blandford reported that some 17,000 privately - financed accommodations ducing homes for Negro workers, for non-white families will be made available under the NHA's war housing program. As of September, he said, 4,800 of these had been completed and arly 10,000 others were under construction.

"These are good sized figures," he said, "but they are not a drop in the bucket compared to the amount needed in the days ahead. The important thing is that private financing of housing available for Negroes has not been provided in the past — but an entering wedge has been driven at last."

It is an "important wedge," Mr. Blandford declared, because "it is one which eventually may well test the economic soundness of housing for Negroes and which may even alter a lot of conclusions about housing occupied by Negroes necessarily deflating the value of surrounding properties."

Blandford reported, some 1,300 units, to cost an additional \$4,000,-000, have been added to the public program.

Negro families also shared importantly on the basis of income and need in the pre-far program of low-rent housing built with federal financial assistance, Mr.Blandford pointed out. A total of 46,200 homes, accommodating nearly 185,-000 people, were made available to Negroes through peacetime public housing, he said.




