PORTLAND PARK BUREAU TOURNAMENTS OPEN

Tournament events sponsored by the Bureau of Parks and Public Recreation that are having so important and frequent place in the passing show of these crisp fall days, may be viewed as a sort of grand pageant—the brilliant finales to the preliminary training and play that goes on continually in the various centers here and there about the city and county.

The pick of Portland's public links golfers were teamed with the city's leading professionals at the City View course in the Oregon Public Links Golf association's first pro-amateur tournament last weekend. Many of the star players in this weekend's Portland Open tournament have gained their "par" and "birdie" ratings on park bureau sponsored courses. Last weekend, members of Portland's field-hockey team played in the Northwest Women's Field Hockey tournament at Grant Field with teams from Eugene, Corvallis, Washington and Idaho.

The opening games in the 1944-1945 basketball pageant played at Jefferson High school Tuesday night, brought together men's and women's teams that use recreation center courts for their practice. In all park bureau-sponsored recrea-

What begins as play in games and athletic activities at the community recreation centers usually develops into practice and lots of practice usually has the bright blooming of a tournament event.

In the extended program of the recreational division of the Bureau of Parks to meet the demands of the increasing population of our war-busy city a recreation center is easily available to the residents of almost every section of the city, and where a community building is not available a supplementary program is carried on in the school. In

these indoor play centers they who seek athletic prowess, instruction in art, the crafts, drama, music, dancing, sports or games may find their recreational desires and athletic aspirations fulfilled. They are designed to fill the recreational needs and desires of everyone, of every age level, and practically all they have to offer is "for free." Portlanders might well include among their thoughts of blessings this Thanksgiving season a mindfulness of the opportunities offered through the city's recreational program, and feel a fervent gratitude.
