The wedding was followed by a reception in the home of the bride-groom's parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Proctor, 2054 N. Williams Ave.


The house was a riot of beautiful flowers, chrysanthemums, carnations, etc., a wedding cake, oh, so tall, adorned the table and also mountains of gifts.

Postal Unit Giving Santa Claus Big Hand

WITH U. S. FORCES IN THE UNITED KINGDOM—When Santa Claus visits the European Theater of Operations this year he'll have the biggest load he's ever hauled across the Atlantic. The eleven Negro soldiers of this unit under the supervision of first Lt. Ernest J. Harris, 1118 Embury Ave., Neptune, New Jersey, are handling over six British Carloads of mail a day.

The unit is the oldest Negro postal unit in the ETO.

"The men that have gone to France will get priority. We are doing everything in our power to see that they get their packages on time," said Lt. Harris, one of the first Negro Officers to be commissioned in Britain.

In a building about the size of a sub-post office building in Chicago, the eleven men and their helpers sort incoming and outgoing mail and parcels in addition to selling money orders, stamps and War Savings Bonds.

The unit was activated in July 1942, at Camp Lee, Virginia. First Lieutenant Wellington Parker, of 2625 Dante St., New Orleans, La., commanded it when it arrived in England in August 1942.


