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

Lipman Wolfe and Co., one of the largest stores in downtown Portland refused to serve a colored girl in their Tea Room on Friday of last week. This, notwithstanding the fact that Harold Wendell, general manager of Lipman Wolfe Company is the president of the Commuity Chest an organization which controls the funds of the Urban League and other social agencies. To the public the people connected with social agencies are supposed to be far above any kind of racial discrimination. In fact these are the people who are supposed to be fighting segregation in any form. Yet when Mr. Wendell was contacted by a representative of the PORTLAND INQUIRER and asked what he had to say on the matter his answer was that he refused to make a statement other than that they had never discussed policy in reference to serving Negroes in their tea room.
